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Why UK FRS need to focus on wildfires?

If conditions are right, it's hard to stop them happening

They're becoming more frequent

They're increasing in severity

They're becoming more disruptive

It's **probably** (*definitely*) going to get worse before it gets better.



What do UK FRS class as a wildfire?

For UK purposes; *"Any uncontrolled vegetation fire which requires a decision, or action, regarding suppression"*

FRS need to define what a wildfire is.....rather than which outdoor fires have the potential to become one!

- *Involves a geographical area of > 1 hectare
- Has a sustained flame length of > 1.5 metres
- *Requires a committed resource of \geq 4 FRS appliances
- *Requires resources to be committed for \geq 6 hours
- Presents a serious threat to life, environment, property and infrastructure

Allows the significance of wildfires across a large range of service impacts including;

- Geographical area
- Risk to personnel
- Service resilience
- Resource Implications
- Economic Cost
- Impact on 'Business as Usual'
- Impact on the wider community



UK Wildfire Statistics



- Fire and Rescue Services attended almost 260,000 wildfire incidents in England in this eight-year period (an average of about 32,000 incidents per annum). Weather conditions are likely to have had a significant impact on wildfires incidents in England.
- The greatest number of incidents, area burned, and duration were each in 2011-12 (almost 50,000 incidents, over 14,000 hectares burnt and a total duration of 60,000 hours).
- National Operational Guidance Programme (NOGP) defined wildfire incidents estimated to be 7,141 incidents in these eight years – or 2.75% of the total
- National Reporting Tool 65 incidents 2018 / 96 incidents 2019 / 149 incidents 2020 and 178 incidents in 2021





The Wildfire Tac Ad Capability


- Developed 2016/17 first deployed July 2018
- "Best Endeavours" National Resilience
- Currently 45 Wildfire Tac Ads
- Lead Officer for WTA is SM Dave Swallow H&WFRS
- Northumberland FRS leads national WTA training
- Regular CPD events
- 2020 13 major wildfire incidents / 19 WTAs mobilised - Inc. Hatfield Moor / Wareham Forest / Chobham Common





WTA Concept of Operations

- Technical wildfire capability advice to the Operational / Tactical Incident Commander (IC) inc. full 360° incident ground assessment
- Review of the current tactical fire plan and advise on any immediate safety concerns inc. the location and tasking brief of any deployed Safety Officer / Lookouts.
- Advice to the IC team to develop suppression / defensive tactics to contain / suppress the incident.
- Provide initial advice based upon expected weather / fire behaviour in the next 4-6 hours. Then the next 12 / 24 / 36 / 48 hours and analyse probable fire development / behaviour.
- Liaison with partner agencies e.g. Forestry Commission, land owners/agents, Environment Agency, Police, Local Authority.
- Advice regarding potential future wildfire logistical requirements e.g. personnel and appliance resources, specialist vehicles and assets, external partner and expert advice.
- Advice on suitable, safety zones, escape routes access / egress routes for assisting wildfire assets.
- Advise whether any external agencies should be requested to attend as advisors to the IC team.
- Support research teams who may deploy to the incident after initial emergency phase **Excellent Local Contacts.**



What should FRSs already be considering?

- IRMP / CRR identification of RUI risk
 - 2015 v 2021
- Gap analysis NOS / NOG
- Review wildfire training at all levels is it appropriate and embedded?
- Partners Multi Agency Exercising and Tactical Wildfire Plan development including researchers
- Does the FRS have a role within local or regional fire groups?
- Populate the National Reporting Tool / Wildfire Asset Register
- Burn Suppression Teams
- Night-time operations
- Are you confident your service can map and mitigate fuel risk?

Development of Tactical Burn Teams

- Limited number of teams across UK
- Would like to grow the capability to compliment the Wildfire Tac Ads
- 10-12 teams with 8-10 personnel would be ideal.
- Significant benefits for FRS
- Have proven their value at a number of large wildfire incidents – notably Winter Hill
- But capability development not without some challenges!!
- Great opportunity for FRS to support academic research





Greece Deployment 8th – 15th August 2020

- Offer of support made by Home Secretary
- Very fast response (a few days) utilising existing UK FRS International Search and Rescue (ISAR) framework for necessary speed of deployment
- Teams from London, Merseyside, Lancashire, West Midlands and South Wales plus National High Volume Pump Capability Lead – this was not a dedicated NFCC Wildfire response.
- 7 day deployment was very well received and a was successful deployment – but not optimal. Looking to enhance the offer for the next mobilisation.





Greece Deployment cont.

- Very high media interest and very positive coverage.
- Embedded Sky News team followed the UK deployment – some media challenges.
- NFCC working with National Resilience / ISAR / Home Office / FCOD on future deployment models.
- Rapid Assessment / Light / Medium response models (?)
- Will require some changes to the current NFCC Wildfire Tac Ad procedures and model

Some current and future areas of focus

- Enhancing the relationships within HMG Home Office / Defra / FCOD / Cabinet Office etc.
- Embedding the Wildfire Tac Ads as a funded / partially funded capability within NR and NCAF (National Coordination and Advisory Framework) – resilience and sustainability.
- Development of a Wildfire Framework for England demarcation of roles and coordinated activity.
- UK Fire Danger Rating project game changer for FRS?
- Via South Wales FRS partner on the EU AFAN project (Advanced Fire Analyst Network) – take advantage of the expertise across EU and the technology that is already available.
- Looking to develop a Wildfire Tac Fire Analyst Cell to provide remote advice to the incident command team – NIFRS model.

Current and future focus

- Better understanding of public perceptions of wildfire risk and threat to shape and target prevention messaging.
- Working with partners across Northern Europe who are in a similar position regarding increasing wildfire threat to the UK.
- Better understand of the health impacts of wildfires on responders and the public.
- Provided input as consultee into the Defra project developing land management prescribed burn training.
- Ability to better understand the impacts of climate change and climate projections.
- Better engagement with research community to assist FRS to understand, plan and prepare for wildfire more effectively and how can we support the research more effectively as a sector
